

## WORLD ENVIRONMENT DAY



This year's World Environment Day was celebrated under the slogan "only one earth" with a main focus on "living sustainably in harmony with nature."

In our own little effort to sustaining the environment, PANKO youth center organizes awareness forum to educate the beneficiary kids, staff as well as community members on the importance of creating a friendly ecosystem that enables the environment to flourish by eradicating indiscriminate disposal of waste, tree cutting and burning of bushes among others.

We climaxed our celebration of the World Environment Day with a cleanup exercise in and around the communities whose children are the main beneficiaries of PANKO.

## HEALTH TALK ON HEPATITIS B

With education on personal hygiene, environmental sanitation and general preventive trainings, outbreak of diseases is mostly minimized. PANKO health team headed by Ms. Lydia Akumbisa (a trained nurse) and Mr. Latif Shahadu (first aider from St John's ambulance) plans a periodic health talk, where they inform and educate our beneficiary kids on prevalent topics on health and how to stay safe and free from diseases and sickness.

The most recent health talk was on **"Hepatitis B"** where the kids were taken through the types, causes, symptoms as well as the preventive measures of this killer virus. More health topics and more advocacy work to be covered in the near future.



## GARDENING

One important feature of PANKO Youth Center is the freedom it provides and a safe haven that brings to life so many endless possibilities. Sport, drama and many more are some of the reason(s) the youth enjoy their stay and many more have fallen in love with gardening. From land preparation, nursing to transplanting, each step of the way remains a beautiful moment for them. With our storage water tanks, the garden stays green always.

With the center's "hot meal" before start of sessions, vegetables from the garden, like cabbage, lettuce, carrot, pepper, tomato and sweet potato is enjoyed by the children. They are indeed learning from the mantra "grow what you eat."
